
STOP PRESS!

From 2 September 2013
School leaders must, prior to appointment ensure that newly appointed teaching staff are not subject to a prohibition or interim prohibition order.

A letter containing the details on this legal requirement and how to check for prohibition was 'Alerted' to KAHSC Subscribing schools on 9 January 2014. The Single Central Record has also been updated to include a column in which to record the date the 'Prohibition' checks were carried out. A similar requirement applies to Teacher Supply Agencies.

KAHSC Online Accident Reporting - New Feature!

Over recent months we have been developing our website and the online reporting systems. A new feature which we have added to the Online Accident Reporting system allows documents (risk assessments, witness statements, photographs, site maps etc.) from an accident investigation to be uploaded and attached to a particular accident report.



Attaching documents can be done in a few easy steps when logged into the 'Manage Accidents' area of the website.

- Click on the paperclip icon next to the report record
- Add attachment and select the document type from the drop down menu
- Click 'Browse' to find the saved document on your computer
- Click 'save'.

REMYTH BUSTING

Issue: A school has plans to remove and replace the wooden parquet flooring in its workshops with concrete because of 'fire risk'.

Busted: Health and Safety legislation does not require the replacement of wooden floors unless there are good reasons to replace the floor such as deteriorating condition. The health and safety advisor who made this recommendation should be challenged to explain the reasons for this. The school may be able to avoid considerable expense and upheaval.

Issue: A school has displayed a sign on its main gate advising parents that the use of mobile phones on school grounds is banned for health and safety reasons.

Busted: Whilst there are a number of reasons why a school may decide to ban the use of mobile phones - any connection to health and safety is tenuous. Rather than communicate the policy via a sign on the school gate, they would be better to make the reasons behind this decision clear to parents and pupils perhaps in the school newsletter or on its website.

Live baby chicks

A recent HSE Myth Buster enquiry told of a school that refuses to allow pupils to bring live baby chicks into school for a presentation quoting health and safety (particularly bird flu) as the reason. The HSE have responded to the enquiry with a statement saying "health and safety legislation does not prevent children from bringing pets and small animals to schools... the small risk of any type of infection can be readily controlled by simple everyday measures like hand washing".

Children often want to take pets/animals into school to show their friends or as part of curricular activities. Some schools even have egg hatching projects. When planning such activities the following should be considered:

Caring for the animal - ensure that they can be properly cared for during their 'visit', that this is not unduly stressful for them and that any 'unwanted interactions' with other animals can be prevented.

Housing and food - They must be properly housed and containers used for transportation must be appropriate, different species must be housed separately, and ensure that the owner brings all necessary food and water with the animal.

Handling the animals - children must be shown how to handle the animals properly. Handling should be done over a table or trough filled with a soft material such as sawdust so that the animal only has a short distance to fall if dropped. Animals which appear nervous should not be handled and the handling of delicate/fragile animals such as stick insects should be kept to a minimum.

Hygiene - Children and adults should always wash their hands immediately after handling any animals or any contact with bedding etc. Hand washing for very young children may need to be supervised. Cuts and abrasions should be covered.

Phobias - Schools should be aware that some pupils/parents may have phobias of certain animals and an effort made to segregate the animals from the people with the phobias.

Council Fined after school janitor loses toe

In September 2011 Fife Council extended the current duties carried out by school janitors. In addition to the simple gardening duties in school grounds, they would undertake basic chainsaw work removing fallen trees or branches - work which had been carried out by the Council's Parks Department. Mr Davies and two other workers then attended basic chainsaw training in November 2011. Following his training Mr Davies was sent to Canmore Primary School in Dunfermline where an ash tree had blown down. The job was much bigger than had been anticipated and so a colleague was contacted for assistance. During the work Mr Davies climbed onto the trunk and started to cut through a single limb, as he was doing so it sheared away from the trunk and landed on his foot trapping it against the trunk.

Mr Davies required three operations but doctors were unable to save one of his toes. He spent three months recuperating before returning to work.

The HSE investigation concluded that Fife Council had failed to properly assess the risks to employees while undertaking chainsaw operations, failed to provide a safe system of work and training and supervision provided was insufficient.

They were fined £20,000 after pleading guilty to breaching Section 2(1) of the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974.

Asbestos expert fined after workers exposed to potentially-deadly fibres at a college

Steven Kelly of Winsulate, an asbestos removal firm, was supervisor on a refurbishment project at Trafford College in Stretford

During the project Mr Kelly chose to ignore the company's procedures for working with asbestos. HSE inspectors carried out an unannounced visit to the college and found employees working in the contaminated area with their own clothes under overalls, half masks and lace up boots instead of disposable clothing, full-face respiratory masks and wellington boots, putting them at risk of breathing in asbestos fibres and carrying fibres home on their clothes.

It was also found that insufficient water was provided for workers to sponge down boots and masks to stop fibres becoming airborne; used clothing was discarded inside the enclosure and daily checks on masks were not carried out.

After pleading guilty to breaching the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974, Mr Kelly was fined £790 and paid costs of £250.

The HSE said "...as the site supervisor, Steven Kelly put workers at risk... He should never have allowed three men to go into a contaminated area while wearing their own clothes and without the correct protective clothing and respiratory masks. Workers, their families and anyone else who came in to contact with them would have been put at risk...Thankfully, we were able to stop the work and make sure the clothes were disposed of as contaminated waste".

The HSE Approved Code of practice L143 'Managing and working with Asbestos' was revised In Dec 2013 and can be found on the KAHSC website.

Product Recalls Where we become aware that a

HP Chromebook 11 Charger

Issue: The charger unit on some HP Chromebook 11s can overheat and melt during use.

Models affected: Chargers sold with all HP Chromebook 11s sold prior to December 2013.

What to do:

If you think that appliances in your school may be affected stop using the charger supplied with the Chromebook immediately, and follow the instructions in the recall notice.

Exploding' glue guns concern

CLEAPSS have recently received reports of glue guns 'exploding' whilst in use. The hot melt glue guns were at least 8 - 10 years old and had been routinely stored with their electric cable wound tightly around the body of the gun. Over time this strains the connections inside. Eventually the connections will fail with a bang!!, causing damage to the gun potentially injury to the user.

If you have seen or suspect similar damage to glue guns in your school, please take the glue gun out of use until the wiring can be checked for any faults. It is important that users of these and other similar equipment are made aware of the potential danger of wrapping wires around the equipment which weakens the internal wiring, thus causing the damage.



Potential asbestos risks of Second World War gas masks

Around one hundred and seven millions gas masks were produced between 1937 -1942 normally containing asbestos in their filters. Tests have shown that asbestos fibres can be inhaled by wearing the masks and may also be released from handling the masks, filters or carrying bags contaminating not only the person handling the mask but also the surrounding area.



The HSE has advised that they do not think it is appropriate for children or teachers to wear or handle WWII gas masks unless it can be clearly demonstrated that the particular mask does not contain asbestos.

If your school owns or is loaned WWII gas masks, you should remove the mask from use immediately until it can be determined whether the asbestos has been removed by a licensed asbestos removal company. This should take the form of documented evidence. Whilst awaiting confirmation of removal, the mask should be double bagged, sealed and labelled with a 'Warning contains asbestos' sticker. The canvas carrying bags cannot be cleaned - these should not be handled and should be treated as contaminated material.

Even if the mask is 'safe' they must never be worn.

Need support writing and reviewing your school's Sex and Relationship Policy?

It is a mandatory requirement for all schools to publish their school curriculum by subject and academic year, including their provision of personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE). To support schools in doing this, the PSHE Association have published its own guidance on drafting and reviewing a school's Sex and Relationship Policy and a suggested programme of study for PSHE. Academies and free schools are also required to publish information



similar to that required by the regulations relating to their curriculum through their funding agreements. The PSHE Association guidance can be found on the KAHSC website or via the following link http://www.pshe-
